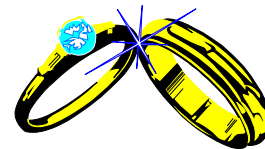

Ann Welton provided the following. It was in "Letter to the Editor" of the Stanton newspaper.

To the Editor:

This is what makes me proud to be an American. Red Shirt Friday. If the red shirt thing is new to you, read below how it went for a man.

"Last week, while traveling to Chicago on business, I noticed a Marine sergeant traveling with a folded flag, but did not put two and two together. After we boarded our flight, I turned to the sergeant, who'd been invited to sit in first class across from me, and inquired if he was heading home.

"No," he responded. "Heading out?" I asked.

"No. I'm escorting a soldier home."

"Going to pick him up?"

"No. He is with me right now. He was killed in Iraq. I'm taking him home to his family." The realization of what he had been asked to do hit me like a punch to the gut. It was an honor for him. He told me that, although he didn't know the soldier, he had delivered the news of his passing to the soldier's family and felt as if he knew them after many conversations in so few days.

I turned back to him, extended my hand and said "Thank you. Thank you for doing what you do so my family and I can do what we do." Upon landing in Chicago, the pilot stopped short of the gate and made the following announcement over the intercom:

"Ladies and gentlemen, I would like to note that we have had the honor of having Sergeant Steeley of the United States Marine Corps join us on this flight. He is escorting a fallen comrade back home to his family. I ask that you please remain in your seats when we open the forward door to allow Sergeant Steeley to deplane and receive his fellow soldier. We will then turn off the seat belt sign."

Without sound, all went as requested. I noticed the sergeant saluting the casket as it was brought off the plane, and his action made me realize that I am proud to be an American.

So here's to our military men and women for what they do so we can live the way we do.

Red Fridays. Very soon, you will see a great many people wearing red on Friday. The reason? Americans who support our troops used to be called the silent majority. We are no longer silent, and are voicing our love for God, country and home in record-breaking numbers. We are not organized, boisterous or overbearing. Many Americans, like you and me and all of our friends, simply want to recognize that the vast majority of America supports our troops.
